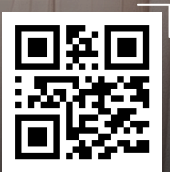

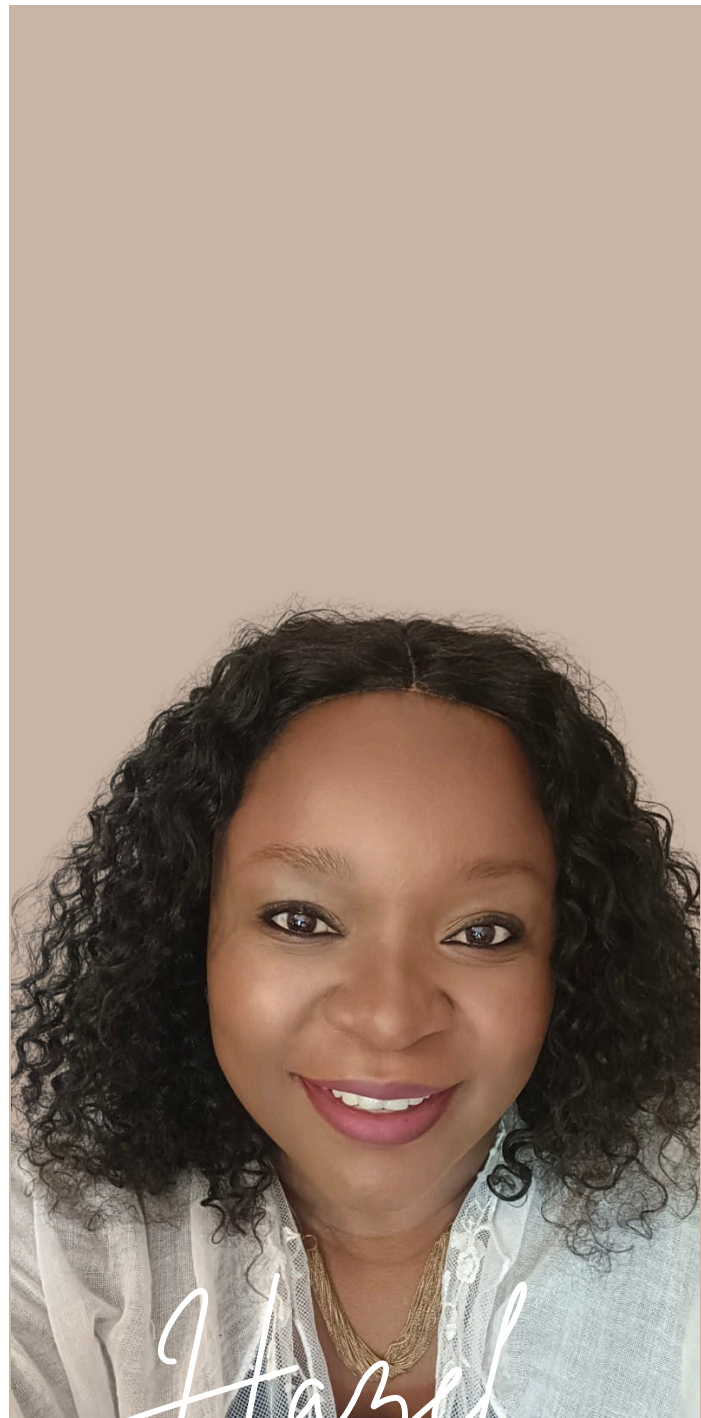

I come from Marsabit, a town located in the northern region of Kenya within Marsabit County, one of the largest counties in terms of area among the 47 counties in Kenya. In our area, girls often experience considerable marginalisation. Together with various organisations and members of the community, we've been involved in mentoring young girls through our leading Girls of Legacy programmes, which worked to raise awareness about the importance of education, health and the necessity of abandoning harmful cultural practices and empowerment initiatives.

MY EDUCATIONAL JOURNEY WAS DRIVEN BY MY DESIRE TO ADDRESS HEALTH ISSUES IN MY COMMUNITY

I pursued a nursing degree at the University of Nairobi and later completed a master's in public health, focusing on health systems strengthening, quality and risk management, community development and empowerment. With over 10 years working as a paramedic and emergency medical services, I now handle quality management and innovations in prehospital care.

My educational journey was driven by my desire to address health issues and economic status in my community. In our region, maternal mortality rates are alarmingly high, with nearly 1,000 deaths per 100,000 live births, among the highest in sub-Saharan Africa. This dire situation spurred my collaboration with the Phillips Foundation to enhance public and primary health care access and address maternal health challenges in Marsabit. Phillips Foundation's primary purpose is to provide access to quality healthcare for underserved communities.

AWAKENING TO A CAUSE

Our initiative, as part of the Safe Motherhood campaign, began when we partnered with the Phillips Foundation, which provided the Phillips Backpack. This backpack supports community health care, facilitating maternal follow-ups during pregnancy and assessments of newborns and young children. We presented the community's maternal health issues to the foundation and received support for our approach.

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The project utilises community health workers to monitor pregnant women's health, including nutrition and blood pressure, throughout their four antenatal care visits. Our efforts are particularly focused on first-time young mothers, who often lack experience and understanding of pregnancy and its challenges.

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THE SAFE MOTHERHOOD CAMPAIGN

“The global campaign to lower the death rate of mothers started in February 1987 at the Safe Motherhood Conference in Nairobi, Kenya. This important meeting, led by UNFPA, the World Bank, and WHO, focused on the serious problem of women dying from pregnancy and childbirth issues and urged the world to take action. Following this, in 2018, the Philips Foundation and AMEN Kenya launched a project that greatly improved the abilities of community health workers, making maternity care better and more accessible. These workers showed great determination and creativity, especially during the COVID-19 pandemic, by providing healthcare in very remote areas. Their work shows how important it is to give community health workers the right tools and knowledge to improve health services and support the health of mothers and communities.”

INNOVATIVE SOLUTIONS

INTEGRATED HEALTH INFORMATION SYSTEM

The health backpacks provided by Phillips foundation have proved invaluable. Initially, the community health workers, who are volunteers, lacked motivation. However, through incentives and comprehensive training that covered new health dynamics, their engagement and effectiveness improved significantly. These workers care for not only mothers but also the elderly and young children, advancing preventive care by addressing issues like deworming, water purification, and the prevention of diarrheal diseases. Their training encompasses hygiene, sanitation, and various aspects of primary and preventive health care.

The community health workers have become proficient in using the Phillips Backpack, with the foundation providing additional technical mentorship and training. This support has enabled us to monitor their performance and the quality of data collected from the community. Regular community dialogues help us understand health progress and learning needs, allowing for effective feedback and improvements in community health initiatives.

Collaboration with the government has been crucial, especially in understanding and utilising data collected by the health workers. The information gathered is managed by community health assistants before being integrated into the health information system. Despite these efforts, challenges remain, particularly with infrastructure and emergency response. Transporting patients in crisis, often via motorbike or makeshift stretchers, highlights the urgent need for better emergency services. Regrettably, even when patients reach hospitals, the facilities' capacity to manage emergencies is often lacking. This has necessitated additional support, such as requesting ambulances from the Ministry of Health, which unfortunately are not always adequately equipped, further exacerbating the challenge.

INNOVATIVE SOLUTIONS- THE DONKEY OUTREACH INITIATIVE

To overcome the lack of road access in hilly and remote areas, we introduced donkey outreach. By loading donkeys with water, backpacks, medication kits, and other essentials, we were able to reach communities otherwise inaccessible by vehicles. This innovative approach not only proved cost-effective but also demonstrated that effective solutions can be found to deliver healthcare to mothers in need.

CHAMPIONING CHANGE

FIGHTING AGAINST FEMALE GENITAL MUTILATION

Furthermore, combatting harmful practices like female genital mutilation (FGM), prevalent in our region has been an area of focus. These practices have devastating effects on young mothers during pregnancy, leading to complications like fistulas and other pregnancy-related injuries. In collaboration with fellow organisations within our county, we have echoed and reinforced their voices and spurred collective efforts in tackling these harmful practices, with a particular emphasis on their health ramifications.

The intensified campaign against female genital mutilation has successfully dispelled deep-rooted myths that have persisted for centuries, while simultaneously educating communities about the detrimental consequences of such practices. Consequently, there exists a heightened awareness regarding the adverse effects of these harmful traditions. Our collaboration with traditional birth attendants and elderly women, who were once practitioners of these rituals, is aimed at instigating sustainable change in both behaviour and mindset within our communities. Through various programmes, such as the "Leading Girls of Legacy" initiative and other burgeoning projects, we strive to empower young girls, encouraging them to reject these harmful practices and assert their rights—an aspiration strongly supported by numerous women in our region. This paradigm shift has enabled us to target and address the health issues faced by young girls and mothers within our communities more effectively.

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MENSTRUAL HYGIENE MANAGEMENT CAMPAIGN #ENDPERIODSHAME

In addition, Amen Kenya has initiated the menstrual hygiene campaign #EndPeriodShame. This campaign aims to raise awareness and educate on sexual reproductive rights. Through this initiative, Amen Kenya has launched a pilot project that distributes reusable pads, targeting girls within Marsabit County. Follow us and join the campaign.

Planning for the future involves advocating for comprehensive, long-term solutions with the Ministry of Health, partners, and government officials to achieve sustainable healthcare delivery.

Inspired by our donors' evolving perspectives, we are motivated to create self-sustaining programmes. A key initiative in this endeavour is the WiSP project, which aims to equip young women and women in villages with knowledge of health and selfcare while promoting equal opportunity and supporting women in business. This project emphasises maternal healthcare and seeks to bridge the gap in infant mortality by facilitating access to healthcare services.

Over the long term, this project will empower women in these villages to take ownership of and collectively develop solutions that will establish sustainable healthcare infrastructures and resources, benefiting their communities for years to come. The scalability of this model ensures that it can be adopted in numerous other villages.



ADDRESSING GENDER EQUALITY GAPS

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Despite progress, the journey toward gender equality is far from complete. Women around the world still confront significant barriers that limit their educational, economic, and political participation. These include, but are not limited to, restricted access to essential services, discriminatory legislation, unequal pay, and a lack of representation in decision-making forums. Such obstacles not only impede individual women but also stifle the global movement towards sustainable prosperity.

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LEADERSHIP AND LEGACY

Our journey has also been about building leadership skills, focusing on mentoring young girls by sharing our leadership experiences. Unlike traditional roles of authority, we emphasise guiding and nurturing, instilling values and principles that build a success-oriented mindset. I am grateful to my mentors for helping me understand the essence of leadership, which is fundamentally people-oriented, guiding my principle of mutual assistance.

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Currently, I am involved in quality management, dealing with standards, performance monitoring, and process mapping. These elements are crucial in achieving our objectives. Having the best ideas and resources is insufficient without the necessary management skills to execute these plans effectively. At UVG, we aim to integrate these skills to make a tangible impact on people's lives, drawing on our experiences and lessons learned.

We have encountered visionaries with strategic insights, yet realising these visions often requires finding the right donors to turn ideas into reality. Meeting the unique needs of each donor presents a challenge, but our experiences have prepared us to address these effectively.
